MRC GEM - Then and Now Hope for the best, plan for the worst

When we formed MRC GEM 14 years ago, our philosophy was to "Hope for the best, plan for the worst".

We tried to envision the types of emergencies where public health would need surge capacity and to prepare ourselves to offer that support. While paid responders might be ready to deal with likely

emergencies like floods or tornadoes, extra help might very well be needed during the early stages of a response. Similarly, while we might not be in the direct line of a hurricane, our help might be needed to support those who were forced by the hurricane to evacuate.

We also looked at low probability events, like a radiation incident, that would have extreme consequences if they DID occur. CDC personnel trained us in the public health response to a radiation incident. Now, we're widely known for our expertise in standing up and staffing a Community Reception Center (CRC) to screen the public for radiation exposure and contamination. We even had observers from Abu Dhabi's Department of Health at our last CRC exercise!

We have assisted with mass vaccination efforts (the prior pandemic, H1N1 in 2009), large-scale TB testing, and hurricane shelter evacuee support.

What we never anticipated was the need to provide ongoing support for two years and counting! It is a testament to our all-volunteer leadership and our members that we have been able to provide over 17,000 hours of volunteer support to the COVID-19 response.

Our challenge now is to overcome "COVID fatigue" and capitalize on what we've learned, to keep our nearly 1,300 vetted members engaged and ready to respond when needed. We will continue offering monthly learning opportunities, including our flagship Annual Weekend Training Summit (this year July 16-17, 2022). But it's equally important that we continue and enlarge our community outreach, both in terms of membership recruitment and financial support.

Increased donations and grants are needed to keep up with the cost of training our greatly-increased membership, and to help assure continuity in our leadership.
