MEMBER SPOTLIGHT RESPONDING TO COVID

Tim and Reggie are experienced professional registered nurses who live in Gwinnett County, one of the three counties served by MRC GEM. Recently, they graciously gave feedback on their experience contributing to the nearly 18,000 hours of volunteer assistance which MRC GEM provided during our partner, GNR Public Health's COVID response. Their comments shed a great deal of light on both their personal experience and that of our unit, MRC GEM, during the COVID response.

Tim said that early in the COVID pandemic, because he works in the healthcare profession, he understood the importance of getting vaccinated. He also was required to be vaccinated so that he could continue working. He initially went to a GNR Public Health vaccination site for that purpose, having no previous familiarity with the Medical Reserve Corps and frankly, no intention of volunteering. He was so favorably impressed ("blown away" was the term he used) by the dedication of the volunteers he saw working there, as well as the need for more assistance, that "Next day and I'm there," in his words. He immediately saw the need being addressed, and both he and Reggie, a hospital nurse, wanted to help. They went on-line and joined MRC GEM, and within days, they both were volunteering multiple shifts each weekend, in addition to their weekday jobs.

Both Tim and Reggie had the opportunity to observe the practices of GNR Public Health and MRC GEM from the perspective of citizens/patients as well as from the perspective of healthcare professionals. They could not say enough positive things about their experience. From those providing "hands-on" care to those endeavoring to explain and reassure, they said that the process they witnessed, and then were proud to participate in, was both professional and kind, when both were needed modalities. They emphasized that they saw a significant amount of uncertainty and even fear among many who came to be vaccinated, and that these people were dealt with in a positive and professional manner.

Since their initial experience as beneficiaries of MRC GEM and now as active members, Tim and Reggie have also become enthusiastic boosters within the community. They make us proud, and they are proud of us.
